WHAT IS A CANOE??

A canoe is a lightweight narrow water vessel, typically pointed at both ends and open on top, propelled by one or more seated or kneeling paddlers facing the direction of travel and using a single-bladed paddle.



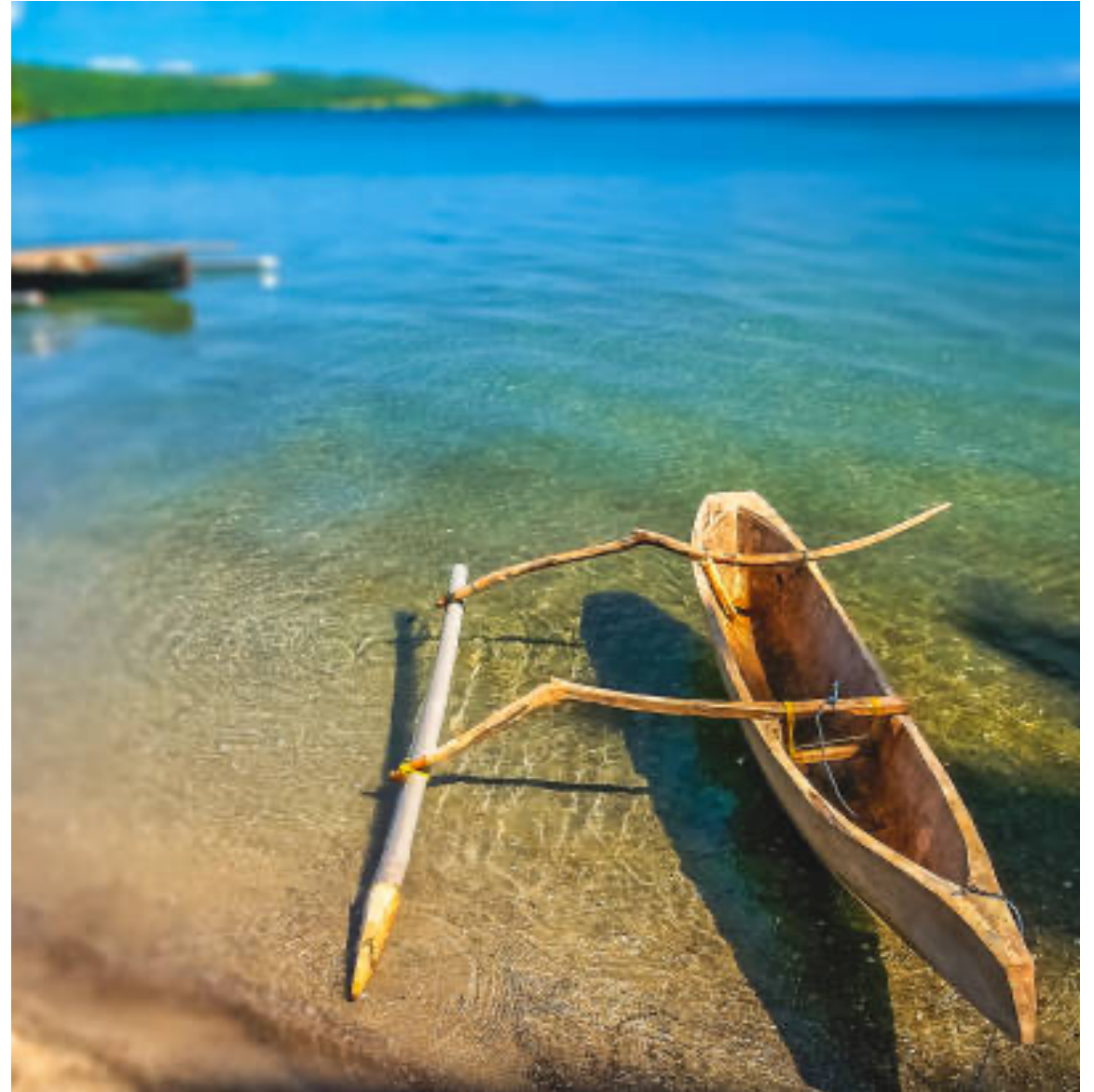
WHAT IS IT MADE OF??

Historically, canoes were dugouts or made of bark on a wood frame, but construction materials evolved to canvas on a wood frame, then to aluminum. Most modern canoes are made of **molded plastic or composites such as fiberglass or those incorporating kevlar, or graphite.**



HOW WAS IT MADE OF??

Canoes were made in the same way as skin boats were made. A wooden hull or frame was formed from a light wood, which was then covered with a waterproof material such as canvas. The wooden frame work was also formed in a variety of ways.



WHAT IS IT USED FOR??

They were ideal for individual transport and were used primarily for **hunting and fishing**. The Canoe, on the other hand, was utilized on a much wider scale. From the Native American tribes to the Polynesians, the canoe enjoyed a variety of scales and uses, primarily transport, trade and warfare.



WHAT DO WE USE TODAY??

The birchbark **canoe** was first **used** by the Algonquin Indians in what is **now** the northeastern part of the United States and adjacent Canada, and its **use** passed ...
